ADD DEPTH To give the ceiling a three-dimensional appearance, I used three different hues: silver in the center, blue-green around the edges, and an undulating band of tan separating the two areas.

CREATE HARMONY Repeating a shape gives a room a sense of unity. Curves and ovals, typical of 1930s furnishings, can be seen in the sofa, the table, and the light fixture, as well as the bowed wall of windows.

BREAK IT DOWN To make a large room feel more intimate, create smaller zones, such as a sitting alcove. Placing an area rug underneath the dining table helps delineate a separate function.

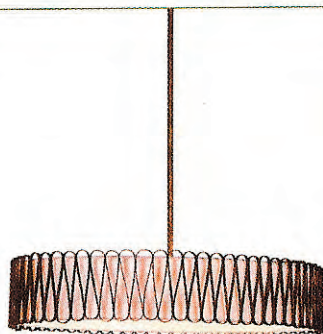
PROVING THAT ELEGANCE AND COMFORT need not be mutually exclusive, New York City-based decorator Diane Paparo designed a sophisticated kitchen eating area with a variety of options for lounging in a Saddle River, New Jersey, showhouse. "It has the look of Hollywood in the 1930s, but it's a bit more relaxed," she explains. A nook with a small sofa and two wing chairs along a dramatic curved bank of windows provides a seating alternative to the dining table. Natural light is at a premium in the otherwise windowless 50-foot-long kitchen, so Paparo chose simple curtains of dark taupe cotton netting fixed in place on

short rods. Shimmery surfaces give the room an aura of Tinseltown glamour and also help disperse light. The ceiling is layered in LusterStone, a plasterlike material with a metallic look. Other shiny touches include a lacquer tabletop with a narrow band of silver-leaf piping, a pale blue-green rug with an attractive sheen, and the sofa frame's silver-leaf finish. A light fixture made of corrugated copper casts a rosy glow that complements the faux terra-cotta floor tiles and the tones of the stenciled pattern above the arched windows. Vintage 1970s chairs have rosewood backs that echo the color of the cherry cabinetry in the kitchen, helping link the two areas.

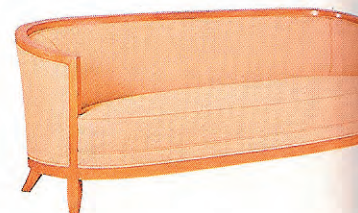
